

...the motion, to take over District 22. Northcutt agreed with that estimate saying that amount would pay for three people to be on duty 24/7.

The amount of money that the county could expect to collect from the Town of LaCrosse in MSTU fees is estimated to be \$14,827.19. Given those figures, what remains is a deficit of \$735,172.81.

In discussing the deficit amount, Northcutt commented, "It would be up to the Board of County Commissioners to determine how to address that deficit as part of their determination of how the county addresses this issue. They determine whether we need to cut something else or find a way to get more revenue," he said.

While the deficit is a concern to all, one person believes he could surmount that problem. "I could run this department on one-third of the \$750,000 the county says it would cost for them to run it and it would be staffed with three trained fire fighters around the clock," said Paul McDavid, a 27-year veteran fire fighter and LaCrosse's fire chief. "I suggested that amount when costs were discussed during the meeting," he said. "It would save the county and the tax payers quite a bit of money and provide the service the citizens in our district deserve." McDavid says he is working up a plan to demonstrate how that could be accomplished.

However, he is not fighting to keep the fire department in LaCrosse. "If we can't staff it properly, how would the public benefit? I'd rather give it to the county to run," he said.

In the event that the county eventually does take over fire/emergency services for District 22, Dubberly has requested that the station be located within the district. "That's a very important safety issue for us. Insurance and other costs would increase if the county decides to run calls out of Alachua, High Springs or Waldo. We need a physical station located within our district," she said.

Although the county manager is tasked with providing options and a timetable, Northcutt is expected to participate fully in the April 7 meeting. "We will show a full analysis of what each station and each small community does in the system and provide a full overview of services provided to the unincorporated areas," he said.

The joint meeting on March 3 was heavily attended by residents and business owners within District 22. The April 7 meeting is expected to garner the same level of participation by LaCrosse area property owners who want to make sure their tax dollars are paying to protect them in case of a fire or other type of emergency.

After hearing that the department was only able to afford to have one person on duty after 8 p.m. to staff the fire station and take care of calls within the district, current Commission Chair Chuck Chestnut commented that he was surprised to

Holly Burton is standing on the top step at the front doorway welcoming folks to her school with a proud smile. It is Monday, March 9, just eight days away from the School Board of Alachua meeting on March 17. Since learning that Superintendent of Schools Dr. Owen Roberts has developed a plan to reconfigure and consolidate Waldo Community School with Shell Elementary School in Hawthorne, the strategy to prevent that from happening has been top priority for PTO Treasurer Griffith and the community of Waldo.

Today is a dress rehearsal for a presentation Griffith will make on March 17 to the School Board of Alachua County.

She says she is nervous. But she is well prepared. The research has been done on the cost of school closures and the detrimental effects it can have on students and a community.

Margaret Cannon, 88, has just chosen her seat on the left side of the auditorium about 10 rows back. She started going to school at WCC in 1939. She remembers the stage she is facing so well from an assignment her class was given to present the history of Waldo. "Jimmy Harvey and I had to write an essay about the history of Waldo," Cannon says with a smile, "and I was the only person not born here." She remembers how difficult the assignment was to do, but still recalls writing about the old cigar factory in town.

Next to Margaret sits the town historian Penny Dodd who has been publishing The Waldo Phoenix newsletter now for five years. This "Special Edition" has a giant headline S.O.S. which means "Save Our School" and she addresses the citizens of Waldo with this sentence: "The City of Waldo wants to make it clear that we DO NOT support or condone the proposal of the School Board to close Waldo Community School. The Mayor and Council members will be fighting this fight with you."

Ferguson police chief resigns

A federal report found racial bias in his department.

FERGUSON, Mo. — The police chief in the St. Louis suburb of Ferguson resigned Wednesday in the wake of a scathing Justice Department report prompted by the fatal shooting of an unarmed black 18-year-old by a white police officer.

Mayor James Knowles III announced at a news conference that the city had reached a mutual separation agreement with Chief Thomas Jackson, who will get a severance payment and a year of health insurance.



Li Col. Al Eickhoff will become acting chief March 19. Jackson had previously resisted calls by protesters and some of Missouri's top elected leaders to step down over his handling of the August shooting of Michael Brown and the weeks of sometimes-violent protests that followed. He was widely criticized from the outset, both for an aggressive police response to protesters and for his agency's erratic and infrequent releases of information.

He took nearly a week to publicly identify officer Darren Wilson as the shooter and then further heightened tension in the community by releasing Wilson's name at the same time as store security video that police said showed Brown stealing a box of cigars and shoving a clerk only a short time before his death.

"The chief is the kind of honorable man you don't have to go to," Knowles said. "He comes to you when he knows that this is something we have to seriously discuss."

Jackson submitted a four-sentence letter in which he said he was announcing his resignation with profound sadness.

He told the St. Louis Post-Dispatch that he felt it was time for the city to move on.

"I believe this is the appropriate thing to do at this time," Jackson said. "This city needs to move forward without any distractions."

Jackson becomes the sixth employee to resign or be fired after the U.S. Department of Justice last week issued the report that cleared Wilson of civil rights charges in the shooting but found a profit-driven court system and widespread racial bias in the city police department.

Justice Department officials had previously said that they were willing to work with whatever leadership the police department had. A.U.S. law enforcement official said Wednesday that the Justice Department had not pressured or encouraged Jackson to resign during meetings with him but had also not resisted the idea. The official spoke on condition of anonymity because of the ongoing meetings between the Justice Department and the police department.

The resignation was welcomed by state lawmakers who represent Ferguson.

"There would be a lot of people that would approve of that," said Democratic state Rep. Sharon Pace, who represents the neighborhood where Michael Brown was shot.

Copter crash kills 11 troops

Searchers struggle in the fog in the Panhandle.

EGLIN AIR FORCE BASE — Searchers struggled Wednesday to find seven Marines and four soldiers killed when a helicopter crashed, hampered by the same fog that plagued a nighttime training mission.

A second helicopter turned back safely shortly before the wreck, which left debris washing ashore along the Florida Panhandle, officials said.

Military officials haven't said what caused the crash of the UH-60 Black Hawk, but the weather was bad enough for the other crew to return to land, said Maj. Gen. Glenn Curtis, adjutant general of the Louisiana National Guard.

The helicopter that crashed had a crew from Hammond, Louisiana, that served multiple tours in Iraq and helped humanitarian missions after Gulf Coast hurricanes and the BP oil spill.

They were carrying unconventional warriors from the Marines Special Operations Command. Like the Army's Green Berets and the Navy's SEALs, they were highly trained to endure grueling conditions and sensitive assignments on land and at sea, from seizing ships to special reconnaissance missions and direct action inside hostile territory.

Tuesday night's training involved practicing "insertion and extraction missions," using small boats and

helicopters to get troops into and out of a target site, said Capt. Barry Morris, a spokesman for the Marine Corps Special Operations Command at Camp Lejeune, North Carolina.

The training is dangerous. "It has everything in it except for the bullets, so when they are actually training, it's like being in combat in a lot of ways," said Bruce Labrecque, the owner of the Mariners Inn in Hammond, Louisiana, near where the Guardians were based. The spot is popular for lunch for locals and military in the area.

President Barack Obama expressed his condolences to the families and said he's confident of a detailed and thorough investigation, said his spokesman, Josh Earnest.

Kim Urr, 62, who works at the Navarre Beach campground near the Eglin Air Force Base training area, said she heard a strange sound, followed by two explosions around 8:30 p.m. Tuesday.

"It sounded like something metal either being hit or falling over. That's what it sounded like. And there were two booms afterward, similar to what you hear with ordinance booms, but more muffled," Urr said.

Human remains were found Wednesday before the weather deteriorated again, and all 11 service members were presumed killed. But it was still considered a search and rescue mission. A small flotilla of boats searched the choppy water, airmen walked shoulder-to-shoulder down the beach, scanning the sand.

Pa. trooper on long road to recovery

BLOOMING GROVE, Pa. — Alex Douglass, 32, ran a 50-mile race last year. Now he's learning to get around on an artificial hip. Six months after a sniper's bullet tore into his body, the Pennsylvania State Police trooper has undergone 15 surgeries to repair the damage, and No. 16 is on the horizon.

"He's doing as well as can be expected," said his boss at the Blooming Grove barracks, Lt. Christopher Paris. "He is determined to continue to improve."

Eric Frein, 31, is charged with opening fire outside the barracks on Sept. 12, hitting Douglass in the pelvis and killing Cpl. Bryon Dickson. Police searched the northeastern Pennsylvania woods for 48 days before finding him.

Baby's imminent birth diverts jet flight

GREENSBORO, N.C. — Shaniqua Cherry wasn't due to deliver her fourth child until late this month, but the baby girl came early, forcing Cherry and the Atlanta-bound plane on which she was a passenger to make an unscheduled stop Tuesday in North Carolina so she could give birth.

"She just started tapping me," boyfriend Hassan Lulu said. "So I woke up, and she told me her water had broke. I really didn't believe it at first. I was like 'Are you sure? Are you OK? You don't think you can wait?' She said 'No, it's coming now, right now!'"

Cherry delivered a 7-pound girl, Nylah, in an ambulance on her way to Women's Hospital of Greensboro. They were doing well Wednesday.

Man, boy in IS video are ID'd as French

PARIS — A man and a boy featured in an Islamic State group propaganda video that threatens Jews and shows the killing of a Palestinian have been identified as French citizens, and investigators are looking into whether the man is related to an extremist who attacked a Jewish school in southern France in 2012, an official said Wednesday.

The extremist group claimed the Palestinian was an agent for the Mossad, and the adult in the video made reference to the targeting of Jews both in Europe and Israel. But the man's father said he had simply regretted his decision to join IS and was killed because he wanted to go home.

Fla. 'church' loses tax-exempt status

PANAMA CITY BEACH — A Florida "church" that hosted naked paint parties and slumber-party Sundays featuring the "sexiest ladies on the beach" has lost its tax-exempt status.

The News Herald of Panama City reported that The Life Center: A Spiritual Community has been operating a seven-day-a-week party called Amnesia: The Tabernacle since Feb. 28.

Assign on the door says events are alcohol- and drug-free, but Sheriff Frank McKeithen calls the party atmosphere a "blatant slap in the face" to taxpayers. He says the organization's officials are "trying to get around the laws."

Patrons are charged a "donation" of \$20 at the door. On the walls inside are T-shirts emblazoned with obscene gestures and signs that say "I hate being sober."

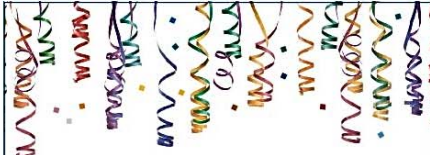

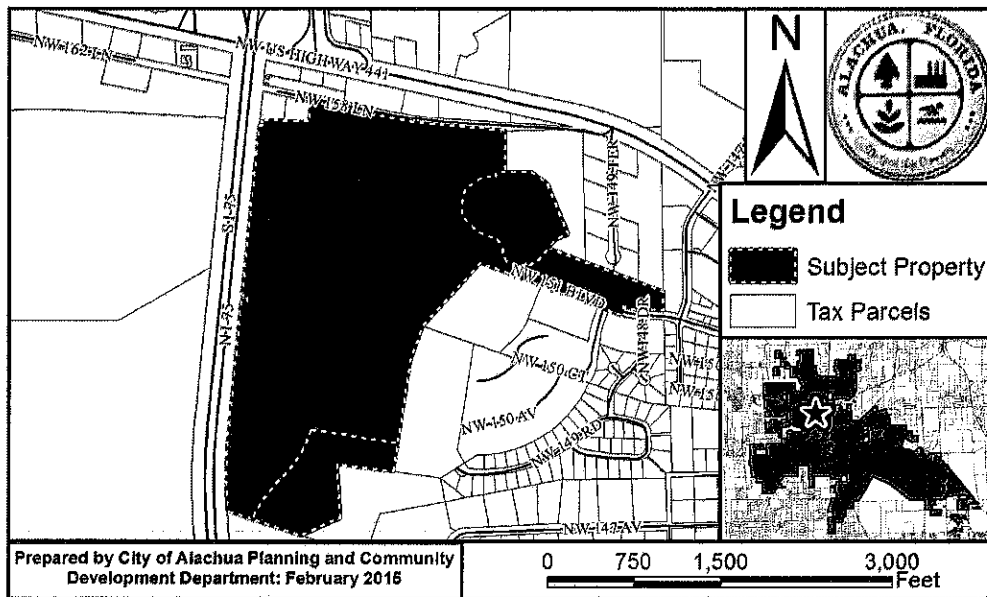
