

Ocala area society hosts regional daylily meeting

OCALA — The members of the Ocala Area Daylily Society have been busy since May 2017 preparing for the American Hemerocallis Society Region 12 Fall meeting in Ocala on Saturday.

Region 12, which includes all of Florida, has two regional meetings a year, in the spring and fall. The event being held in Ocala will begin at 9 a.m. Saturday at VFW Post 4209, at 4805 NE 36th Ave. It will include the meeting and workshops, for which participants must pre-register, and which includes lunch, for a fee of \$30.

The keynote speaker will be Tim Bell, of Bell's Daylily Garden in Sycamore, Georgia, which is home to more than 900 varieties of daylilies.

The regional meeting event will include clinics, silent and live auctions, raffles and door prizes.

In conjunction, members of the public can purchase daylilies beginning at 9 a.m. Saturday, at \$5 a plant, in different varieties and colors, until they are sold out.

"The Ocala Area Daylily Society formed about four years ago," said president Pat Hawk of Reddick. "This is the first time the society has hosted anything like this regional meeting. It is a small group, with only a dozen or so working to pull together the meeting."

Hawk described the upcoming event as educational, but said it also is a social event during which those who are interested in learning about daylilies can exchange ideas and methods.

According to Gene Perry of Castleberry, a member of the Ocala group, who arranged for Bell to speak, he is excited for the presentation as "Bell has one of the finest gardens in the country."

The scientific name for daylily is *hemerocallis*. The genus *hemerocallis*

is native to Asia. The American Daylily Society, also known as the American Hemerocallis Society, Inc., is a nonprofit service organization established in 1946, whose membership includes more than 5,000 members worldwide.

According to Taglilien am Niederrhein, a daylily garden in Niederrhein, Germany, the words "hemera" and "kallos" mean "day" and "beauty." Each flower blooms only for a day. One mature flower stalk can produce dozens of flower buds. An older plant, for example, can produce up to 500 flowers. This extends the flowering period up to four weeks. Through a combination of early and late flowering varieties, that makes a flowering period of several months possible.

The garden's information online states that by the mid-1920s, Americans became involved in daylily breeding and have taken the lead. Among the reasons for success are excellent climatic conditions, especially in Florida, during which a newly planted seedling will usually bloom in the first year. In Germany you must wait, usually two or more years, until a seedling gets to bloom.

By 2011, there were more than 70,000 registered daylily varieties throughout the world.

According to the American Daylily Society's website, "Originally, the only colors were yellow,

difference by 3.60 percent, which required a majority vote by the commission. The rolled back rate would have produced \$153,051 less than the higher proposed rate. The higher rate will enable the City to undertake infrastructure maintenance and adjust for future growth



The Commission also approved final reading for the designation and creation of infrastructure improvement areas, two of which are located west of the city and one to the east. The infrastructure plans are for improvements to



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
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

IMPORTANT INFORMATION REGARDING POSTED NOTICE SIGNS


Pursuant to Section 2.2.9(D) of the City's Land Development Regulations, posted notice signs must be placed on the land that is the subject of the application, along each street which is adjacent to or runs through the land in a manner that makes them clearly visible. Signs shall be posted at intervals of not more than 400 feet when the land subject to the application has less than 1,500 feet of road frontage. When the land subject to the application has 1,500 feet or more of road frontage, signs shall be posted at intervals of not more than 1,320 feet.

Signs shall be inspected by the City subsequent to their posting. The applicant shall be responsible for ensuring that the posted notice is maintained on the land subject to the application until the completion of the final public hearing on the application.

Signs must be removed by the applicant and returned to the City within ten days after the final decision on the application.

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
