Call to Order Mayor Davis, City of Waldo, Chair, called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. Quorum **A** quorum was met in accordance with the Council's bylaws. **Invocation** Commissioner Wilford, City of Alachua, delivered the invocation. **Pledge of Allegiance** Attendees recited the pledge to the flag in honor of the United States of America. **Introduction of Guests** Mayor Davis recognized the guests in attendance. **Approval of Consent Agenda** The following consent agenda items were approved unanimously. # **Financial Report for March 2019**

Minutes of the March 28, 2019, meeting.

**Revenues** and expenditures are within budget for the first six months of the fiscal year. Revenues are at 45% of the budget while expenditures are at 46% of the budget. The financial condition of the council remains strong and the adjusted general fund balance should remain at an acceptable level at the end of the fiscal year.

#### **Transportation Disadvantaged Coordinating Board (TDCB) Appointments**

The following TDCB appointments are recommended: *Mr. Jeffrey Aboumrad, Florida Department of Education Representative,* for the Dixie, Gilchrist, and Union County TDCB's, *Ms. Monica Caraway, Local Medical Community Representative,* for the Bradford County TDCB, *Mr. Ralph Williams, Florida Department of Elder Affairs,* for the Gilchrist County TDCB, and *Mr. John Wisker, Florida Department of Children and Families Representative,* for the Bradford County TDCB.

#### **Approval of Regular Agenda**

The regular agenda was approved unanimously.

### Guest Speaker, Marilyn Stephens, Assistant Regional Manager, Atlanta Regional Office, United States Census Bureau

Ms. Stephens, explained the importance of the census by highlighting the following information:

- Every household will have the option of responding to the census online, by mail, or on the telephone.
- 95% of households will receive a census invitation in the mail.
- Information to be sent in the mail to households includes: (1) March 12 20 An invitation to respond online to the 2020 census, (2) March 16 24 A reminder letter, (3) March 26 April 3 A reminder postcard, (4) April 8 16 A reminder letter and paper questionnaire, and (5) April 20 27 A final reminder postcard before a follow-up visit is made by a census worker.
- The census counts every person living in the United States.
- The U.S. Constitution mandates that everyone in the country be counted every 10 years--the first census was in 1790.
- The census is about fair representation in reapportioning the House of Representatives in determining the number of seats each state has representing them.
- The distribution of federal funds, grants, and support to states, counties, and communities is largely based on census data.
- State officials redraw (re-district) the boundaries of the congressional and state legislative districts in their respective states to account for population shifts.
- Completing the census is mandatory.
- Census data is used to support community initiatives involving legislation, quality-of-life, and consumer advocacy.
- Businesses use census data to decide where to build factories, offices, and stores thereby assisting in creating jobs.
- Local governments use census data for public safety and emergency preparedness.
- Real estate developers use census date in making decisions regarding the construction of building new homes and in the revitalization of old neighborhoods.

- It is anticipated that 80% of the 2020 census will be completed online.
- It is against the law for the U.S. Census Bureau to release private responses to the public which could identify respondents.
- The U.S. Census Bureau, by law, cannot share respondent answers with any other government agency.

#### Resolution Recognizing the Service of Mr. P. Steven Futch as the Private Representative on the Bradford County TDCB

A resolution was approved unanimously for Mr. Futch for his service on the Bradford County TDCB since 1994.

# Scott Koons, NCFRPC Executive Director, Elected Chair of the University of Florida Urban and Regional Planning Graduate Program Advisory Council

The general purpose of the Advisory Council is to provide professional guidance to the students, faculty, and in curriculum development with the primary functions being to: (1) Act as a liaison between planning and related professions and the department; (2) Offer advice and insight regarding practical issues and trends impacting the profession with relevance to urban planning education; (3) Assist with professional development and ethics training for students; (4) Serve as mentors to the students to equip them for life after school as planning professionals; (5) Support development and fundraising activities which position the department as the top planning school in the country as future leaders in the profession; (6) Provide proactive input to the curriculum of the department to ensure it prepares students to deal with urban and regional planning issues of the future; (7) Increase alumni engagement with the department; and (8) Advocate and assist in departmental re-accreditation activities and site visits as well as in significant college and university initiatives.

#### **Executive Committee Report (Mr. Koons Presented the Report)**

#### Proclamation Declaring the Week of May 5 - 11, 2019, as Travel and Tourism Week

**The** original "Florida Tourism Task Force" was created as part of the Council 27-years-ago. It is now a 14-county independent tourism marketing interlocal agreement organization. The mission of the task force is to: "Promote the natural, historic, and cultural attractions of the North Central Florida region to increase the number of visitors and extend their stay." The proclamation was approved unanimously.

#### **Clearinghouse Committee Report**

Commissioner Adams, Lafayette County, Chair, presented the report and stated that the Committee recommends the following "Comprehensive Plan Adopted/Draft Amendments" be approved for: City of Alachua (Draft) and City of Alachua (Adopted). Motion was approved unanimously.

#### Middle and Lower Suwannee River and Withlacoochee River Task Force Report

Commissioner Davis, Madison County, Chair, presented the report and indicated that the Task Force did not meet quorum requirements earlier this evening. However, a discussion ensued among task force members and others in attendance regarding the continuing strategies to address the ongoing raw sewage spills emanating from two wastewater treatment plants in Valdosta, Georgia, into several of Florida's rivers and streams. The Task Force is comprised of one county commissioner from each of the twelve counties in the NCFRPC region. Commissioner Ken Cornell, Alachua County, represents Alachua County on the Task Force. Commissioner Davis indicated that:

- He, Commissioner Cornell, Mr. Koons, and others recently attended a legislative committee hearing, which was well received, in Tallahassee and presented the Council's concerns regarding the ongoing Valdosta spills.
- The Secretary of the Florida Department of Environmental Protection (FDEP) and his staff are being very cooperative in collaborating with the Council.
- A meeting of the task force with the Valdosta City Council was recently held to discuss critical issues regarding the ongoing spills which are most often the result of major rain events.
- The City of Valdosta has 6,000 manholes.
- A holding area which will hold 10 million gallons of overflow will be developed in the near future which should alleviate some of the spill(s) problem(s).
- Measures to improve and expedite "immediate notification" requirements are being undertaken.
- Another meeting with the Valdosta City Council will be conducted on July 10, 2019, at 6:00 p.m. in Valdosta.
- The next meeting of the task force will be held on July 25, 2019.

Ms. Darlene Velez, Suwannee River Water Management District (SRWMD), made a presentation to the task force regarding 'Water Quality Monitoring" in the SRWMD service area. She stated that:

- The SRWMD Water Quality Mission is to: (1) Ensure quality improvement projects in support of FDEP "Total Maximum Loads" and "Basin Management Action Plan" efforts are ongoing; (2) Develop and update "Surface Water Improvement and Management (SWIM)" plans; (3) Assist state partners in identifying trends and areas of concern in environmental monitoring functions; and (4) Assist in emergency response sampling.
- SRWMD monitors trends regarding nutrients, metals, alkalinity, chlorophyll, physical parameters, total organic carbon, common anions, and cations.
- SRWMD does not monitor trends regarding bacteria, pesticides, herbicides, mercury, pharmaceuticals, radionuclides, industrial byproducts, and petroleum products.
- SRWMD and FDEP groundwater and surface water quality trend stations are strategically located and regularly-scheduled tests are done monthly, quarterly, biannually, or yearly depending on a pre-determined schuedule.

- SRWMD, FDEP, and the Florida Department of Health have specific missions and collaborate with one another to address water concerns. Health advisories are issued by FDOH when E. coli results are above 410 cfu/100ml and sampling continues until an acceptable level is reached.
- The spill sampling response for the December 2, 2018, Valdosta spill was: (1) On Monday, December 3, 2018, Florida's state agencies were notified with FDEP coordinating sampling efforts; (2) On Tuesday, December 4, 2018, FDEP sampled the Withlacoochee and Suwannee Rivers; (3) On Wednesday, December 5, 2018, SRWMD sampled the Alapaha, Withlacoochee, and Suwannee Rivers; (4) On Friday, December 7, 2018, FDEP sampled Withlacoochee and Suwannee Rivers; and (5) On Tuesday, December 12, 2018, SRWMD sampled the Lower Suwannee River.

The next Task Force meeting will be held on July 25, 2018, at the Holiday Inn and Suites in Lake City beginning at 4:00 p.m.

#### **Citizen Comments**

**Stew Lilker, Publisher, Columbia County Record,** made a comment regarding a fundraiser being held this Saturday in Columbia County related to animal issues. He also encouraged the Council to make reports at its board meetings regarding county and city projects and success stories.

**Commissioner Helen Warren, Gainesville,** reported that the city received a transportation grant and the city's Regional Transit System (RTS) is making trips from Lake City to the Oaks Mall and Shands. **Commissioner Gigi Simmons, Gainesville,** also stated RTS is making trips between Trenton and Newberry to the same locations in Gainesville. She stated that the trips are free and ridership is the key to make this transportation program a success.

### **Executive Director Report**

*Mr. Koons* briefed the council on the following items:

#### Florida Regional Councils Association (FRCA) Monthly Activity Report

Mr. Koons indicated that FRCA is the statewide organization which is comprised of ten Regional Planning Councils (RPC's). The mission of FRCA is to strengthen Florida's RPC's and its partners with government and the business community to enhance regional economic prosperity and improve the consistency and quality of regional planning councils to ensure they add value to state, regional, and local initiatives. *Denise Imbler, FRCA Statewide Coordinator,* advises and supports NCFRPC in fulfilling its mission. Mr. Koons summarized FRCA's activities for March.

## Florida Chamber Foundation Scorecard

Mr. Koons reminded council members that the Florida Chamber Foundation developed the Florida Scorecard to provide state leaders with the metrics needed as a tool to secure Florida's future. In performing this task, the Florida Chamber's primary objective is to develop a 20-year statewide strategic plan which requires an ongoing commitment to measuring the state's current status toward accomplishing the stated goals of the "Six Pillars" which were established to measure trends and progress. The "Six Pillars" incorporate the strategic thinking of a diverse range of stakeholders including the Century Commission for a Sustainable Future, Florida Council of 100, Enterprise Florida, Florida State University, Workforce Florida, 1000 Friends of Florida, and others. The "Six Pillars" are:

- Talent Supply and Education.
- Innovation and Economic Development.
- Infrastructure and Growth Leadership.
- Business Climate and Competiveness.
- Civic and Government Systems.
- Quality of Life and Places.

Mr. Koons summarized the "State of Florida Metrics" for March 2019. Of note, the unemployment rate rose to 3.5% in March but is still below the full employment rate of 4%.

#### **Legislative Report**

Mr. Koons indicated that the legislative session began on March 5, 2019, and is scheduled to adjourn on May 3, 2019. He stated that the majority of bills the Council was following did not pass this year.

#### 50th Anniversary of NCFRPC

Mr. Koons indicated a special celebration will be held prior to the May 23, 2019, board meeting to commemorate this auspicious occasion.
