Most of the positions they are recruiting are enumerators, or the people who knock on doors during the census collection process, he said.

They are also recruiting some supervisor, clerical and support positions.

Census takers must be 18, be U.S. citizens with a valid Social Security number, have a valid email address and be registered with the selective service system or be exempt. Engle said they are trying to recruit veterans, who are usually among those exempt.

They will consider residents who are not citizens for positions such as language translators if necessary, he said.

"We need people who are trusted voices in their communities," he said.

Most employees should have a valid driver's license or access to public transportation and have access to a computer with internet for training. Those who are offered a job must pass a criminal background check.

While officials wouldn't say how many people they're looking to hire, Alachua County reached about 55% of its recruiting goal as of Friday, according to a weekly report by the U.S. Census Bureau.

Marion County, where enumerators are paid \$14.50 an hour, was at 67% of its hiring goal, the report said.

Two recruiting events will be held in Gainesville in February where representatives will look for potential employees and answer generic questions

about the census, Engle said.

The first is Feb. 3 from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. at Fort Clarke Middle School, 9301 NW 23rd Ave. The second is Feb. 15 from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. at Howard Bishop Middle School, 1901 NE Ninth St.

For the first time, this year's census can be completed online. Anybody can fill out the census at public libraries and community centers with public computers.

"We're trying to get everybody to do it online because that's the way of the world now," he said.

The paper census is still offered because about 20% of the population doesn't have access to high-speed internet, Engle said. Organizers also recognize that not everyone is comfortable with putting their information online.

Richard MacMaster, Gainesville's Interfaith Alliance for Immigrant Justice coordinator, said everyone needs to complete the census, not just citizens, because everybody is represented by its results.

"It's terribly important that everyone be counted — no matter who they are or where they are or how long they've actually been here," he said.

Florida is projected to gain another congressional seat as a result of this census, but the state might also lose one if its population is undercounted, he said. Federal money distribution is also allocated depending on population.

After the last census, New York had to go to court for a recount after a massive undercount meant the state and its cities didn't get

enough federal funding. MacMaster said recent national census news worries him because it might lead to undocumented immigrant communities not reporting the census. This month, the Department of Homeland Security agreed to share citizenship information with the U.S. Census Bureau after the Supreme Court's rejection of a citizenship question on the 2020 form.

However, the U.S. Census Bureau assures that responses are safe and cannot be used against anyone.

"As far as immigrants, the census is supposed to count everybody, even if you're somebody who is here today and plans to go back to France months from now," he said. "You are physically here right now."

The kids sat in four vertical rows listening to Simmons and anxious to meet the athlete they were to be paired with. Each athlete was paired with a row of about 15 kids before being sent to a station outside to start playing.

The four groups rotated from the different stations of games — capture the flag, relay race, balloon frenzy and tug of war. A hydration station was also set up with waters for the children and athletes.

When the rain got too hard, plan B went into full affect as everyone moved inside. There, the athletes signed UF athletic posters for the kids and bonded with the children.

Before the athletes were introduced and paired, Fred Awbrey explained in detail about the history of Porters

to the kids and why this location is so significant.

"We're all going to learn something today," Awbrey said. "You are going to know something that almost nobody in Gainesville knows."

After the civil war was finished, Union troops came to Gainesville to reorganize the land. One of the troops was a doctor named Watson Port. He bought the land just west of where the community center sits today.

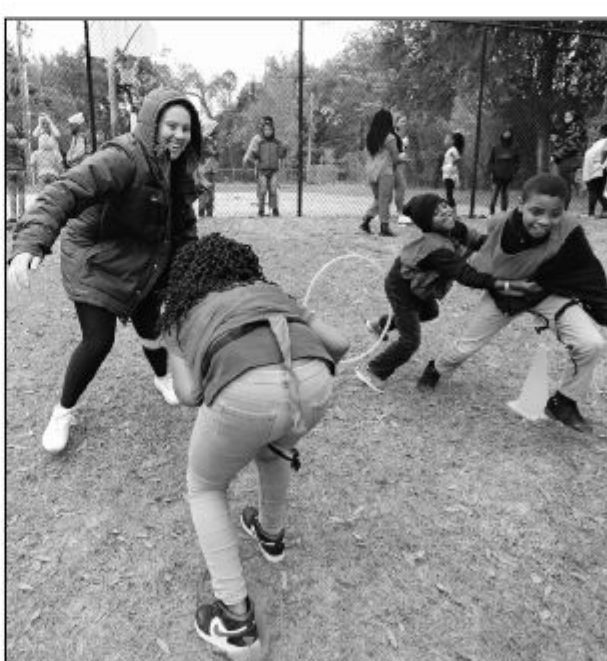
At the time, he sold the land to African American former slaves because the law did not allow them to purchase property at the time.

"So, he was opening up this ability up here," Awbrey said.

In 1883, a group of people opened a baseball field on the property, which was just the beginning.

"Baseball was very, very popular in Gainesville," Awbrey said. "It was the number one sport."

In 1906, the University

of Florida opened and needed a space to play games and, most importantly, wanted to be able to charge money to see the games.

"They wanted to make football pay for itself," he

said. "And the only place is right here."

One of the main reasons they chose this property is due to the 8-foot tall wood fence surrounding the field,

prohibiting anyone from seeing the game for free.

UF played their first game on October 5, 1906, against the Gainesville Athletic Association.

"No college or anything like that," he said.

He estimates the price for the UF vs LSU game this year in the fall will be \$80 and \$90 per ticket, while they were charging somewhere between \$0.25 and \$0.50 back in 1906.

They used that location until 1910, when they moved a fence and a grandstand to the north side of campus where Ben Hill Griffin Stadium sits today.

Up until 1915, this area was known as the University Athletic Grounds and was renamed in honor of Francis Philip Fleming, Florida's 15th governor, he said.

"I hope that I'll be able to work with Gigi [Simmons] again, and we'll put up a historical marker for that area, which was known as Fleming Field," Awbrey said.

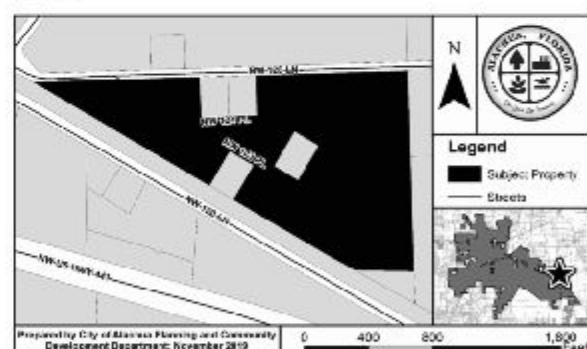

Florida currently has a parental notice law approved by voters in 2004 that also gives a minor the right to appear before a judge to avoid telling a parent. But increasing that standard to consent is viewed by supporters as heightening a parent's oversight.

Sen. Gary Farmer, D-Lighthouse Point, said the change is about "allowing a parent to veto a young woman's decision to have an abortion."

The consent law would not directly affect many Floridians. While there

were 70,239 abortions in Florida in 2018, state records show, Stargel has said that 1,398 of them involved minors, 193 of whom sought a judicial bypass to avoid notifying their parents.

Still, the symbolism of a new abortion restriction is eye-catching. With President Donald Trump having recast the U.S. Supreme Court with the appointment of two conservative justices, 17 states last year enacted some kind of abortion restriction.

Florida, though, lagged and social conservatives have sent a clear message that they expect some kind of action this election year.

A parental consent law approved by the Legislature was overturned

30 years ago by the state Supreme Court, which ruled that it violated the state's constitutional right to privacy, a protection that extended even to minors.

DeSantis, a Trump protégé who the White House is relying on to help deliver Florida this fall, also has reshaped the Florida Supreme Court by naming three conservative justices to replace the retired last three members named by a Democratic governor.

Conservatives hope that if the Legislature approves the restriction this year, a majority of the state's new high court could adopt a different view of privacy when acting on what is certain to be a legal challenge.

Grace Marketplace Director Jon DeCarmino said Grace helped more than 400 Alachua County residents move into permanent housing in 2019, and the funds helped buy a box truck now used to transport furniture for the spaces.

"It's one thing to have a lease and a place to live, but it takes having furniture and everything else you need around the place to make that house a home," he said.

The truck is already being put to good use.

"At this point, we're moving someone into housing every day," he said.

The goal is to move 500 people into permanent housing in 2020, he said.

Raye said he could take no credit for the award.

"It's really the

community giving back to the community," he said. "It's essentially Gainesville citizens giving back to the community, \$1.50 at a time. We're just the middleman."

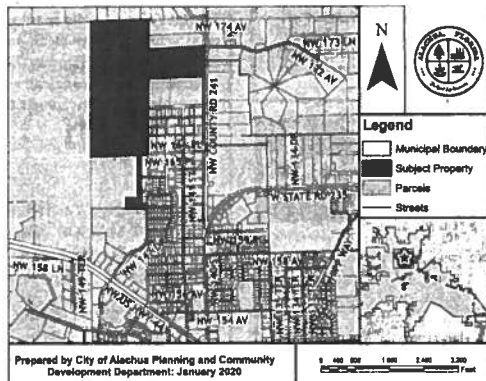

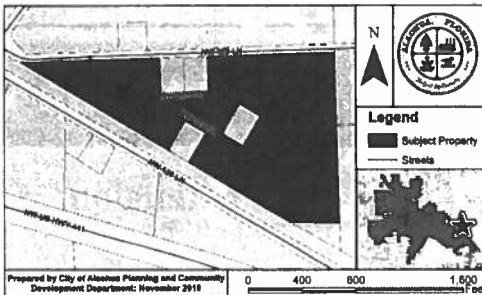

IMPORTANT INFORMATION REGARDING POSTED NOTICE SIGNS

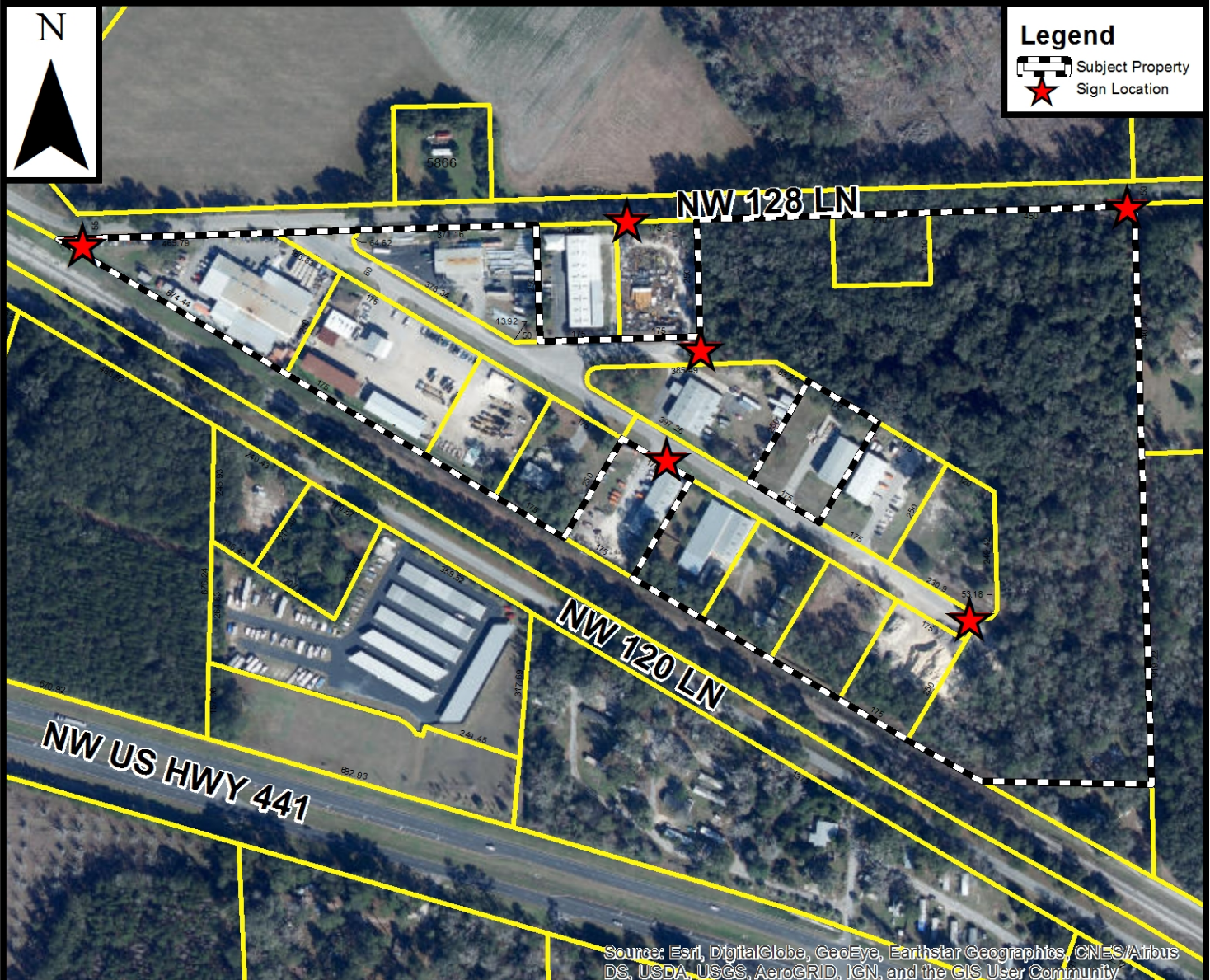
Pursuant to Section 2.2.9(D) of the City's Land Development Regulations, posted notice signs must be placed on the land that is the subject of the application, along each street which is adjacent to or runs through the land in a manner that makes them clearly visible. Signs shall be posted at intervals of not more than 400 feet when the land subject to the application has less than 1,500 feet of road frontage. When the land subject to the application has 1,500 feet or more of road frontage, signs shall be posted at intervals of not more than 1,320 feet.

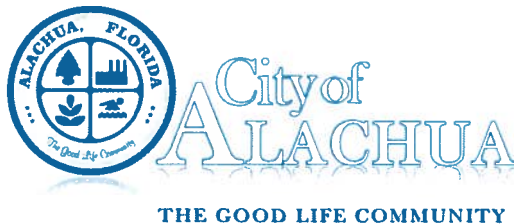
Signs shall be inspected by the City subsequent to their posting. The applicant shall be responsible for ensuring that the posted notice is maintained on the land subject to the application until the completion of the final public hearing on the application.

Signs must be removed by the applicant and returned to the City within ten days after the final decision on the application.

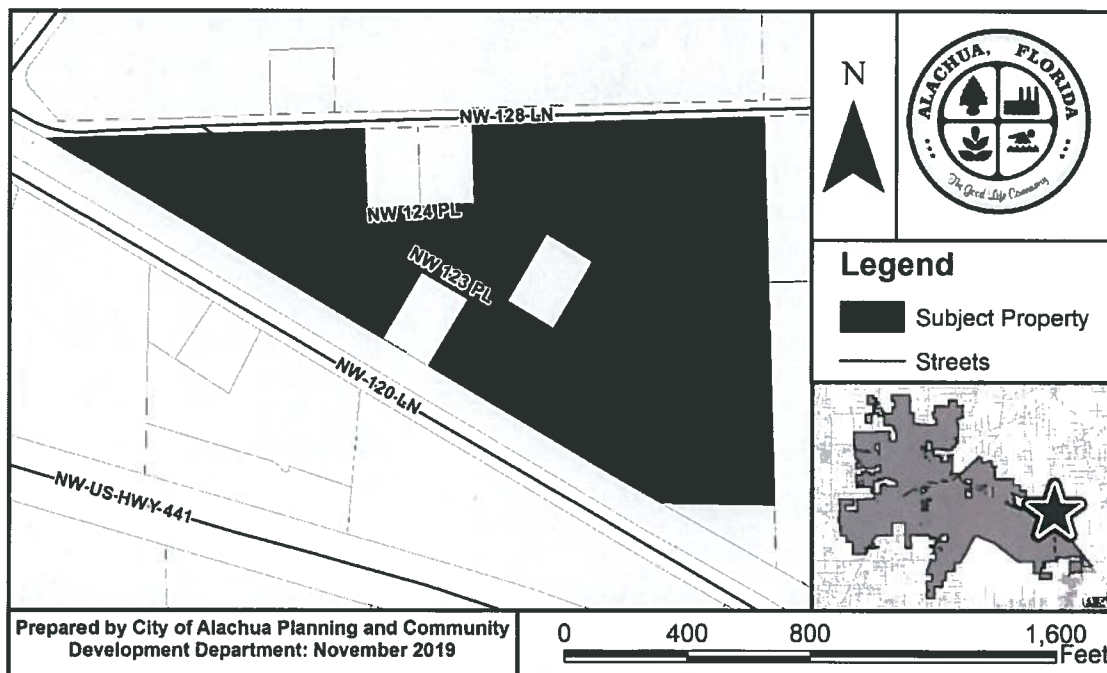
