## **ALACHUA CITY COMMISSION MEETING**

# February 24, 2020

<u>NOTE</u>: The North Central Florida Regional Planning Council (NCFRPC) is comprised of the following twelve counties, Alachua, Bradford, Columbia, Dixie, Gilchrist, Hamilton, Lafayette, Levy, Madison, Suwannee, Taylor and Union; and, fourteen member municipalities, Alachua, Archer, Gainesville, Hawthorne, High Springs, Jasper, Lake Butler, Lake City, Live Oak, Madison, Newberry, Perry, Starke and Waldo. The City of Lake Butler became a member of the Council in January 2020.

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Call to Order. Commissioner Robert Wilford, City of Alachua, Chair, called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m.

Quorum. A quorum was met in accordance with the Council's bylaws.

Invocation. Commissioner Patricia Bouie, City of Hawthorne, delivered the invocation.

Pledge of Allegiance. Members and guests recited the pledge to the flag in honor of the United States of America.

<u>Introduction of Guests.</u> Chair Wilford introduced the guests in attendance. *Ms. Alice Hopkins, Office of External Affairs, Jimmy Patronis, Florida Chief Financial Officer*, was extended a special welcome.

<u>Procedural Clarification Regarding Public Comments</u>. *Chair Wilford* read a statement explaining the manner in which citizens are authorized to participate in the Council's business at this public meeting.

Approval of Consent Agenda. The following consent agenda items were approved unanimously.

<u>Transportation Disadvantaged Local Coordinating Board Appointment for Commissioner Matt Brooks, Levy County Board of County Commissioners, to Serve as Chair of the Levy County Transportation Disadvantaged Coordinating Board</u>

Approval of Regular Agenda. The regular agenda was approved unanimously.

<u>Guest Speaker</u>. There was no guest speaker for tonight's meeting. However, *Lauren Yeatter, AICP, NCFRPC Senior Planner*, made a presentation regarding "Economic Development Strategies for North Central Florida." In addition to highlighting comprehensive economic develop strategies, identifying top and targeted industries, vital project areas, and rural areas of economic opportunity for

Columbia and Suwannee Counties using an econometric regional model, *Ms. Yeatter* briefed the Council regarding the Council's "Visit Natural North Florida (VNNF)" activities. She indicated:

- VNNF was founded as a result of a study conducted by NCFRPC to market the region as an attractive destination to increase visibility and tourism offerings.
- The mission VNNF is: "Enhance tourism while preserving historical, cultural, and natural assets."
- The membership structure of VNNF consists of 14 Counties with one task force member per County, one additional member if a County has a Tourist Development Council, and one additional member if a County has a population greater than 50,000--members are appointed by each individual County's Board of County Commissioners.
- Dues are based on the first two pennies of County bed tax revenues.
- The VNNF marketing program consists of travel shows, advertising with brochures distributed at welcome centers and digitally, a quarterly eNewsletter with a circulation of approximately 7,000, market research, member education, and a mobile-friendly website.
- The top country markets for VNNF are: (1) United States, (2) Canada, (3) United Kingdom, (4) India, (5) Germany, (6) South Korea, (7) Netherlands, (8) Philippines, (9) Brazil, and (10) Denmark.
- The top states accessing the VNNF website are: (1) Florida, (2) Georgia, (3) Texas, (4) North Carolina, (5) Illinois, (6) Virginia, (7) New York, (8) Tennessee, (9) Alabama, and (10) Michigan.
- The top metropolitan areas accessing the VNNF website are: (1) Atlanta, GA, (2) New York, NY, (30) Charlotte, NC, (4) Washington, DC, (5) Birmingham, AL, (6) Houston, TX, (7) Mobile, AL, (8) Chicago, IL, (9) Dallas-Ft. Worth, TX, and (10) Nashville, TN.
- The reasons for the travel shows are they: drive consumers to the VNNF website, inform consumers on a wide variety of products, place collateral material in the hands of consumers and collects emails for marketing, and allow direct interaction with, and provides advice to, potential consumers.
- In 2018-19, there were 12 out-of-state and five international shows attended.
- Due to budget cuts, in 2019-20, nine out-of-state and two international shows have been scheduled.
- As largely a result of VNNF activities, bed tax increases from FY 14/15 through FY 18/19 were **43.28%** for task force counties. Statewide increase were **35.9%**.

**Chair Wilford** thanked **Ms. Yeatter** for her very informative presentation and stated: "Your Power Point presentation was excellent. He then asked if it could be uploaded on NCFRPC's website at www.ncfrpc.org." **Ms. Yeatter** indicated she would do so.

## **Chair Wilford Report**

<u>Introduction of New Member, Commissioner Jack Schenk, City of Lake Butler</u>. *Commissioner Schenk* was welcomed as a new member to the Council. The City of Lake Butler recently became a member of the Council.

Resolution of Appreciation for Matt Hershom, Commissioner, City of Newberry. Commissioner Hershom served on the Council's Board since September 2018. In recognition of his commitment and concern for the growth and development of the North Central Florida Area, a resolution was recommended for approval by the Council. The motion was approved unanimously.

<u>Transportation Disadvantaged Local Coordinating Board Resolution of Appreciation for Commissioner John Meeks, Levy County Board of County Commissioners.</u> Commissioner Meeks served as Chair of the Levy County Transportation Disadvantaged Local Coordinating Board since January 2015. In recognition of his leadership, a resolution was recommended for approval by the Council. The motion was approved unanimously. Commissioner Meeks will remain as a member of the Council.

<u>Middle Suwannee River and Withlacoochee River Task Force Appointment</u>. The Gilchrist County Board of County Commissioners has nominated *County Commissioner, William Martin,* to serve on the Task Force replacing *County Commissioner, Kendrick Thomas.* A motion was made to ratify the appointment of *Commissioner Martin* to the Task Force made by the Chair of the Gilchrist County Board of County Commissioners. The motion was *approved unanimously. Commissioner Thomas* will remain a member of the Council. The Chair thanked *Commissioner Thomas* for being an original member of the Task Force.

<u>South Florida Climate Change Compact and Tampa Bay Resilience Coalition</u>. A presentation concerning this topic will be scheduled for a future Council meeting.

## **Executive Committee Report by Chair Wilford**

<u>Proclamation Declaring February 23-29, 2020, as Hazardous Materials Awareness Week</u>. A motion was made to approve a proclamation in observance of this week. The motion was *approved unanimously*.

<u>Resolution Recognizing the 150th Anniversary of the City of Starke</u>. A motion was made to approve a resolution in recognition of this municipality achieving this milestone. The motion was *approved unanimously*.

NCFRPC Land, Warehouse, and Office Building. Chair Wilford asked Mr. Koons to brief the Council regarding this item. A commercial real estate broker recently contacted Council staff expressing an interest in purchasing the land, warehouse, and office building owned by the Council. The intent of the party interested in purchasing said land, warehouse, and office building is to construct a parking lot for approximately 160 vehicles. After discussing four options in detail for possible consideration at last month's Council meeting, the Council approved unanimously to authorize the Executive Director to sign a site access agreement, authorize the Executive Director to have an appraisal of the land, warehouse, and office building completed, and authorize the Executive Director to research warehouse and office building relocation options.

**Following** is the follow-up to last month's meeting and a chronology of events regarding this property:

- November 1, 1992 August 4, 1999. The Council rented the office building and warehouse during this period.
- August 4, 1999. The Council purchased the office building (7,560 square feet) and warehouse (1,989 square feet) located on a 4.4 acre site at a purchase price of \$490,400. In addition to cash of \$31,400, the Council secured a 15-year promissory note from South Trust Bank in the amount of \$459,000 to purchase the office building and warehouse. Since the Council is a governmental agency, and as such, is prohibited from mortgaging real property to secure a promissory note, the Council pledged certain revenues to repay the promissory note.
- <u>January 1, 2014</u>. A final payment in the amount of *\$3,134.95* was made which fully satisfied the aforementioned promissory note. As a result, the Council does not have any outstanding long-term debt. The average annual building and grounds occupancy cost including insurance, utilities, custodial services, heating, ventilation and air conditioning services, and termite and pest control services is approximately *\$45,000*.

**2019.** The Alachua County Property Appraiser assessed the value of the land at \$499,632 and the assessed value of the buildings at \$318,562 making the total assessed value of the land and buildings \$818,194.

**Pursuant** to the last month's Council action, the Executive Director signed a site access agreement, engaged an appraiser to prepare an appraisal on the land, office building and warehouse, and secured the assistance of a commercial real estate broker to identify office space purchase and lease options for relocation. Both the appraisal and research of relocation purchase and lease options are currently in progress.

<u>Clearinghouse Committee Report</u>. *Commissioner Janice Mortimer, City of Starke, Chair,* presented the report and stated the Committee recommends the following "Comprehensive Plan Adopted Amendments" be approved for the City of Gainesville and the City of Newberry *(3 Amendments)*. The Committee also recommends the following "Comprehensive Plan Draft Amendments" be approved for Alachua County, Columbia County, and the City of High Springs. The motion was *approved unanimously*. The Chair thanked *Commissioner Mortimer* and her committee members for their exceptional work this month in reviewing a large number of adopted and draft amendments.

**Program Committee Report.** No report.

Regional Planning Committee Report. No report.

<u>Finance Committee Report</u>. Commissioner Thomas Demps, Taylor County Board of County Commissioners, Chair, briefed the Council on its FY 18/19 audit. There were no material weaknesses or problems cited. Consequently, there were no findings of non-compliance or reportable conditions. Commissioner Demps indicated the financial health of the Council is strong. A motion was made to accept the FY 18/19 audit and authorize payment to the auditor in the amount of \$16,675. The motion was approved unanimously. The Chair extended thanks to Commissioner Demps and his committee for their efforts in reviewing the audit. In addition, the Chair congratulated Mr. Koons and his staff for not having any material weaknesses which is indicative of the exceptional frugal management of the Council's funds.

Nominating Committee Report. No report.

Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy Committee Report. No report.

Middle and Lower Suwannee River and Withlacoochee River Task Force Report. Commissioner Rick Davis, Madison County Board of County Commissioners, Chair, made the report. As reported at last month's Council meeting, Commissioner Davis reiterated a spill of 7.5 gallons of raw sewage from a lift station outside of Valdosta occurred on December 9th. He stated the raw sewage discharged into Sugar Creek which is a tributary of the Withlacoochee River. Chair Davis noted the City used the notification system established by the Task Force earlier this year. He indicated this early notification allowed local, regional, and state officials to take immediate action concerning this spill. The Hamilton, Madison, and Suwannee County Health Departments issued timely health advisories for residents near the river to avoid contact with its waters. Also, the Florida Department of Health, Florida Department of Environmental Protection, and Suwannee River Water Management District began conducting daily water sampling activities along the river.

**The** cause of this spill was due to human error. A contractor working to install a telepathy system disconnected a reference cable at the lift station for testing and then failed to reconnect it. As a result, the level indicator and alarm agent at the lift station were inadvertently disconnected.

**A** joint workshop by the Task Force and the City of Valdosta was conducted on January 8th in Valdosta. The City provided an update on this latest raw sewage spill and its response and informed the Task Force the City recently received a permit from the Georgia Environmental Protection Division to construct a **10 million gallon** equalization basis at the Withlacoochee Wastewater facility.

**Commissioner Davis,** asked **John Quarterman, WWALS Watershed Coalition (Suwannee RIVERKEEPER),** guest in attendance, to provide additional information regarding this critical information. **Mr. Quarterman** indicated e-coli bacteria was detected in wells in Madison County and voiced concerns related to other water quality issues.

**As** a reminder from a historical standpoint, the Task Force, which is comprised of one county commissioner from each of the *twelve counties* in the NCFRPC region, was founded on October 25, 2018. **Commissioner Ken Cornell, Alachua County Board of County Commissioners,** represents Alachua County on the Task Force. Following are excerpts from task force actions/discussions since its inception:

- Commissioner Rick Davis, Madison County (Chair), Commissioner Cornell, Mr. Koons, and others attended a legislative committee hearing in Tallahassee during this past session and presented the Council's concerns regarding the ongoing Valdosta spills.
- The Secretary of the Florida Department of Environmental Protection (FDEP) and his staff continue to be very cooperative in collaborating with the Task Force and Council.
- Several meetings of the Task Force with the Valdosta City Council have been held to discuss critical issues regarding the ongoing spills which are most often the result of major rain events.
- The City of Valdosta has 6,000 manholes which routinely overflow as a result of heavy rainfall.
- Measures to improve and expedite "immediate notification requirements" to various State of Florida agencies have been implemented by the City of Valdosta.
- A holding area, which will capture **10** million gallons of overflow, is scheduled to be developed and should alleviate some of the problems with spills.
- A joint workshop was held on July 10, 2019, which was attended by several Task Force members and the City of
  Valdosta City Council, for the purpose of discussing the issue of raw sewage spills by the City and determining a
  process to resolve this serious problem. The City Council indicated they are still awaiting a permit from the State
  of Georgia to construct a ten million gallon equalization basin at the Withlacoochee Wastewater Treatment
  Plant later this year. NOTE: As indicated earlier, approval has recently been granted for this project.
- Task Force members met on October 9, 2019, at the Madison County Agricultural Extension Office in the City of Madison with representatives from the City of Valdosta for a joint workshop to discuss the issue of raw sewage spills by Valdosta and how the Task Force and the City can work together to resolve this ongoing issue. Task Force members received an update concerning ongoing projects being taken by Valdosta to address storm water infiltration into the sanitary sewer collection system. Progress remains slow but is proceeding in a very positive direction.

**Chair Wilford** thanked **Commissioner Davis** for his leadership of the Task Force and for its members in continuing to address this critical issue affecting our waterways and wells in North Central Florida.

Recent Update from Fay Baird, Senior Hydrologist, Division of Water and Land Resources, Suwannee River Water
Management District (SRWMD)

Ms. Baird submitted a memorandum to the SRWMD Board of Directors on February 10, 2020, entitled "January 2020 Hydrologic Conditions Report for the SRWMD." This report contains insightful information regarding the following elements: (1) Rainfall, (2) Surface Water, (3) Groundwater, (4) Climate and Drought Outlook, and (5) Conservation. This information is currently

important, especially in order to monitor changes and problems and especially those related to rainfall, surface water, and groundwater, due to the aforementioned raw sewage spill at the Sugar Creek facility in Valdosta. No significant problems were noted in *Ms. Baird*'s report at this time. *Ms. Baird* can be contacted at <u>fay.baird@srwmd.org</u> or 386.362.1001 for more information.

Recent Update from Ben Glass, Legislative and Government Affairs Chief, Suwannee River Water Management District (SRWMD)

On February 17th, Mr. Glass, emailed a copy of a health advisory to various government entities and other organizations in North Central Florida entitled: "Health Officials in Hamilton and Madison County Advise of Possible Bacterial Contamination in the Withlacoochee River: Elevated Levels of Fecal Bacteria." It reads in part: "People are urged to take precautions when in contact with the Withlacoochee River. Water contaminated with elevated fecal bacteria presents several health risks to humans. Microbes in fecal bacteria could cause gastrointestinal issues and other health conditions. Children and older adults, as well as people with weakened immune systems, are particularly vulnerable to disease from this bacteria. Therefore, every precaution should be taken if anyone comes in contact with this river water."

Also, on this date, Mr. Glass, emailed a report to the aforementioned government entities and other organizations in North Central Florida from Ms. Darlene Velez, Water Resources Chief, SRWMD, regarding e-coli level measurements at the following locations: Withlacoochee River at County Road 150, Withlacoochee River at Highway 145, and Withlacoochee at Florida-6. The results for the period February 10th through February 13th are:

- Withlacoochee River at County Road 150. One e-coli reading taken on February 10th was 517.2--any reading above 400 is alarming. The reading taken on February 13th was 193.5.
- Withlacoochee River at Highway 145. One e-coli reading taken on February 10th was 770.1 which was very alarming. The reading taken on February 13th was 290.9.
- <u>Withlacoochee River at Florida-6</u>. There were no readings above **400** during this period. The reading taken on February 13th was **2.9**.

**All** of the levels taken on February 13th were less than the **400** e-coli alarm threshold. **Ms. Velez** can be contacted at **Darlene.Velez@srwmd.org** for more information.

**Ex-Officio Member Reports.** Reports were made, as indicated, by representatives from ex-officio members in attendance:

Florida Department of Economic Opportunity (FDEO). Not in attendance.

Florida Department of Environmental Protection (FDEP). Not in attendance.

<u>Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT).</u> David Tyler presented the report and reminded Council members applications for the Small County Road Assistance Program and Small County Outreach Program must be submitted to the Department by January 31st.

Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FFWCC). Daniel Penniman did not make a report.

St. Johns River Water Management District (SJRWMD). Not in attendance.

Southwest Florida Water Management District (SFWMD). Not in attendance.

<u>Suwannee River Water Management District (SRWMD)</u>. *Tom Mirti* reiterated the aforementioned raw sewage Sugar Creek spill which was attributed to mechanical failure caused by human error and was significant as has been previously indicated.

## CareerSource North Central Florida (CSNCF). Not in attendance.

<u>Citizen Comments.</u> Chair Wilford reminded speakers of the procedures which were outlined at the beginning of the meeting including adhering to civility in making comments. The following individuals made comments: Merrillee Malawitz-Jipson, Our Santa Fe River, Kristen Rubin, Our Santa Fe River, John Quarterman, WWALS Watershed Coalition (Suwannee RIVERKEEPER) and Stu Lilker, Publisher, Columbia County Observer. Most of the comments made were about water quality and the aforementioned recent raw sewage spill. In addition, Mr. Lilker made a comment concerning the lack of transportation in rural areas not being addressed.

**Executive Director Report.** *Mr. Koons* briefed the Council on the following items:

Florida Regional Councils Association (FRCA) Monthly Activity Reports. *Mr. Koons* indicated FRCA is the statewide organization which is comprised of *10 Regional Planning Councils (RPC's)*. The mission of FRCA is to strengthen Florida's RPC's and its partners with government and the business community to enhance regional economic prosperity and improve the consistency and quality of regional planning councils to ensure they add value to state, regional, and local initiatives. *Denise Imbler, FRCA Statewide Coordinator*, advises and supports NCFRPC in fulfilling its mission. *Mr. Koons* summarized FRCA activity reports for December 2019.

Florida Regional Councils Association (FRCA) Policy Board Meeting Report. Mr. Koons reported Commissioner Charles Chestnut, IV, Alachua County Board of County Commissioners, and he, attended the semi-annual Policy Board meeting on January 10th. Reports were made by: Chris Emmanuel, Director of Infrastructure and Governance Policy, Florida Chamber of Commerce, Frank Bernandino, Co-Founder, Florida Resiliency, and Callie DeHaven, Director Division of State Lands, Florida Department of Environmental Protection. In addition, the Policy Board: (1) heard reports by the membership regarding various projects being performed around the state, (2) received the FRCA FY 18/19 annual report, (3) heard a legislative report, (4) reviewed the latest financial report, (5) appointed a Nominating Committee for 2020-21, and (6) received FRCA's annual report for 2018-19. NOTE: The Policy Board is comprised of three representatives (county, municipal, and gubernatorial appointees) from each Council who, in turn, are advised by the Executive Directors Advisory Committee (EDAC) which are comprised of all ten Executive Directors. The following members of NCFRPC currently serve on the FRCA Policy Board: Charles Chestnut, IV, Vice Chair, Lorene Thomas, Member, and Robert Wilford, Chair.

Florida Chamber Foundation Scorecard. *Mr. Koons* reminded council members the Florida Chamber Foundation developed the Florida Scorecard to provide objective criteria to develop a 20-year statewide strategic plan which requires an ongoing commitment to measuring the state's current status toward accomplishing the stated goals of the "Six Pillars" which were established to measure trends and progress. The "Six Pillars" incorporate the strategic thinking of a diverse range of stakeholders including the Century Commission and others. The "Six Pillars" are: (1) Talent Supply and Education, (2) Innovation and Economic Development, (3) Infrastructure and Growth Leadership, (4) Business Climate and Competiveness, (5) Civic and Government Systems, and (6) Quality of Life and Places. *Mr. Koons* referred to the report contained in the "State of Florida Metrics" information for December 2019 which was included in the Council packets.

<u>Legislative Report</u>. *Mr. Koons* indicated the Governor did not recommend any funding in the budget for Regional Planning Councils for FY 20/21. He reviewed several legislative items Council staff is following:

- Growth Management (Senate Bill 410 by Senator Perry). This bill requires a local comprehensive plan to include a
  property rights element and adherence to other provisions in the bill. Bill was referred to the Community Affairs,
  Judiciary, and Rules Committees.
- Growth Management (House Bill 203 by Representative McClain). This bill requires a local government to include
  a property rights element. Bill was referred to Local, Federal, and Veterans Affairs Subcommittee and Commerce
  and State Affairs Committees. Bill was passed by the Local, Federal, and Veterans Affairs Subcommittee. It is now
  in the Commerce Committee.

- Water Quality Improvements (Senate Bill 712 by Senator Mayfield). This bill requires the Florida Department of Health to provide a specified report to the Governor and the Legislature transferring the Onsite Sewage Program within the Florida Department of Health to the Florida Department of Environmental Protection and adherence to other provisions in the bill. Bill was referred to Community Affairs and Appropriations Committees and Appropriations Subcommittee on Agriculture Environment. Bill was passed by the Community Affairs Committee. It is now in the Appropriations Subcommittee on Agriculture, and General Government.
- Water Quality Improvements (House Bill 1343 by Representative Payne). This bill requires the Florida Department of Health and Florida Department of Environmental Protection to submit reports and recommendations relating to the transfer of the Onsite Sewage Program from the Florida Department of Health to the Florida Department of Environmental Protection and adherence to other provisions in the bill. Bill was referred to Agriculture and Natural Resources Subcommittee and Appropriations and State Affair Committees. It is now in the Agriculture and Natural Resources Subcommittee.
- Statewide Regional Evacuation Study (*House Bill 3179* by Representative Burton). This bill provides an appropriation of *\$1.2 million* for the Statewide Regional Evacuation Study update. Bill was referred to the Transportation and Tourism Appropriations Subcommittee. It is now in the Appropriations Committee.

Multi-use Corridors of Regional Economic Significance (M-CORES). Mr. Koons reiterated, from previous Council meetings, M-CORES consists of three Task Forces. They are: (1) Southwest-Central Florida Connector which extends form Collier County to Polk County, (2) Suncoast Connector which extends from Citrus County to Jefferson County and includes Dixie, Gilchrist, Lafayette, Levy, Madison, and Taylor Counties, and (3) Northern Connector which extends from the Northern terminus of the Florida Turnpike Northwest to the Suncoast Parkway which includes Levy County. The purpose of M-CORES is to revitalize rural communities, encourage job creation, and provide regional connectivity while leveraging technology, enhancing quality of life and public safety, and protecting the environment and natural resources. The objective of M-CORES is to advance the construction of regional corridors which are intended to accommodate multiple modes of transportation and multiple types of infrastructure.

**The** Suncoast Task Force met on December 17th in Perry and the Northern Connector Task Force met on December 18th in Ocala. Both Task Forces reviewed draft avoidance and minimization guiding principles followed by a discussion of mitigation and enhancement guiding principles. The next meeting of the Suncoast Connector Task Force will be on February 11th in Madison and the next meeting of the Northern Connector Task Force will be on February 12th in Fanning Springs. Finally, **Mr. Koons** indicated both Task Forces will continue a review of draft avoidance and minimization guiding principles and begin review of draft mitigation and enhancement guiding principles.

Economic Development District Grantee Performance Report for the Period January 1, 2019, through December 31, 2019.

Mr. Koons reminded the Council is a federally-designated economic development district by the U.S. Department of Commerce, Economic Development Administration. As such, the Council submits a report on job creation/retention, private sector investment, and public sector investments for projects funded by the U.S. Economic Development District or other sources which implement the Comprehensive Economic Development adopted by the Council. Mr. Koons highlighted the report by indicating an estimated 1,205 jobs were either created or retained, an estimated \$63,850 in private investment and an estimated \$572,00 in public investment occurred on seven projects for the reporting period.

<u>Regional Directory</u>. *Mr. Koons* reported the regional directory for 2019 was recently mailed to local, regional, state and federal officials, and planning related agencies. A downloadable version of the directory is available on the Council website at *www.ncfrpc.org*.
