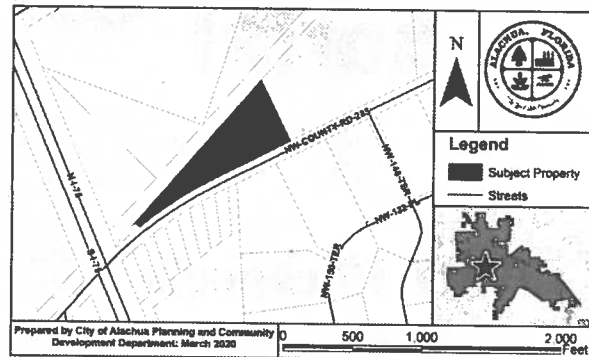

Hurricane season collides with virus

TALLAHASSEE — With the six-month Atlantic hurricane season starting Monday, emergency-management officials have changed how Florida will respond to storms as they grapple with the coronavirus pandemic.

Disaster managers, already working long days because of the pandemic, have modified hurricane plans on issues such as evacuations, shelters and conditions for relief crews because of the virus.

"You know it's not usual that we've been in the (Emergency Operations Center) for three months doing planning before hurricane season, (but) that's going to give us a leg up in a lot of ways because we've been thinking about it day in and day out here," Florida Division of Emergency Management Director Jared Moskowitz said.

The hope is always for an inactive hurricane season, but forecast models aren't crafted for comfort.

"We'll have to see what

the season does.," Moskowitz said. "They say it's going to be an active season. Remember, we had 18 named storms last year. And we almost got (Hurricane) Dorian. So, you know, we'll just have to see what it brings us."

Arthur, which threatened the Carolinas as a tropical storm this month, started checking off the list of storm names for the 2020 season, which will last on the calendar from Monday through Nov. 30. Then came Tropical Storm Bertha, which formed off the Carolinas on Wednesday.

Last week, the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration became the latest organization to forecast an above-active hurricane season, with 13 to 19 named storms, of which six to 10 should reach hurricane status. The range is consistent with other forecasters that presume a La Niña weather pattern rushing warm water into the Atlantic.

In its forecast, NOAA also pointed to warmer-than-average sea surface

temperatures in the tropical Atlantic Ocean and Caribbean Sea, reduced vertical wind shear, weaker tropical Atlantic trade winds and an enhanced west African monsoon wind system. All are factors for above-average storm activity.

"Similar conditions have been producing more active seasons since the current high-activity era began in 1995," a NOAA news release said.

Mixing the forecasts with the virus, the state has created a reserve of 10 million face masks, 1 million face shields, and 5 million gloves.

The approach to shelters and evacuations also will be different.

"We've been always telling people to leave. Now, potentially, county emergency managers will be saying, 'Know your home, know your (flood) zone,'" Moskowitz said. "So, if you live in a surge zone, yes, you'll still have to get out. But if your house was a new construction. It's built to code and we get a Category 1 or Category 2 storm, perhaps they'll decide that the

safest place for you to be is in your home. So, the issue is shelter in place. That's clearly different."

People who go to shelters are less likely to be crowded into single large rooms. Caps will be placed, maybe 50 people to a shelter, or evacuees could be spread across complexes such as schools, where each classroom could be used by five to 10 people. Another possibility is that people could find themselves filling hotels that would otherwise be low on occupancy.

"We've developed an app that hotels can sign up," Moskowitz said. "We have 200 hotels so far signed up to do non-congregate sheltering. So instead of going to a shelter, you'd be assigned potentially to go to a hotel."

Additionally, utility officials told regulators this month that plans are underway to establish more staging areas to reduce crowds of relief workers who would be needed to restore electricity after storms. Also, the

Prosecutor's election suit moves forward

The lawsuit by prosecutor Brian Kramer seeking to have his opponent in the race for state attorney ruled unqualified will go on after a judge in Leon County on Tuesday would not dismiss the case.

Gainesville attorney Beverly McCallum filed the motion, contending that voters should decide who will replace Bill Cervone as the Eighth Circuit state attorney.

"Were (Kramer) to succeed, he would be certified as unopposed and automatically become the top, state-level law-enforcement official in the Eighth Circuit without a single voter's casting of a ballot," the motion states, adding that "the body of law stands for the proposition that even close questions should be decided

in favor of widening — not narrowing, the field of candidates on the ballot, so that the people have a right to vote for the candidate of their choice."

McCallum in December was suspended from practicing law for 15 days by the Florida Supreme Court after the Florida Bar found misconduct in McCallum's complaint of misconduct by judges in the Fifth Circuit, headquartered in Ocala.

Kramer's legal complaint contends the suspension disqualifies her under a requirement in the Florida Constitution that a state attorney be a member of the Florida Bar for the previous five years. By being unable to practice, he believes, she was not a Bar member.

Sharp drop in state tax collections threatens pay raises, programs

TALLAHASSEE — The coronavirus's financial hit on the Florida economy is coming into sharper focus, with a new report showing state tax collections falling almost \$900 million short in April.

And May is likely to be worse, analysts say.

Gov. Ron DeSantis has not yet acted on a \$93.2 billion budget proposal approved by the Legislature in March. But the spending

plan is expected to need dramatic retooling, even if helped by federal aid, state reserves and the governor's anticipated vetoing of hundreds of millions of dollars in programs and projects to reduce costs.

"We are whistling past the graveyard when it comes to our budget," said Sen. Gary Farmer, D-Lighthouse Point. "The idea that we are going to have enough resources in this upcoming budget year is just ridiculous."

Farmer, along with

Senate and House Democrats, have been pushing Florida's ruling Republican leaders to call a special session to rework the budget ahead of it going into effect, July 1.

Included in the \$93.2 billion budget which DeSantis will soon review are pay raises for teachers and state workers, affordable housing dollars and environmental spending that Democrats will defend, Farmer said.

But DeSantis, along with House and Senate leaders,

have ignored the demands, suggesting they want to wait and factor in whatever additional aid may be coming from Congress. The state has drawn \$4.6 billion through the federal coronavirus relief package and is looking for authority to use at least some of this money to cover revenue losses.

Still, the latest report from state economists shows April's revenue down \$878.1 million from its expected level. The bulk of the loss, \$598.2 million,

comes from a drop in expected sales tax collections, the state's biggest source of revenue.

But the report reflects collections in the month of March, when Florida's economy was slowing

before hitting almost a full stop that lasted through April. That month's anticipated tax loss is almost certain to be even larger.

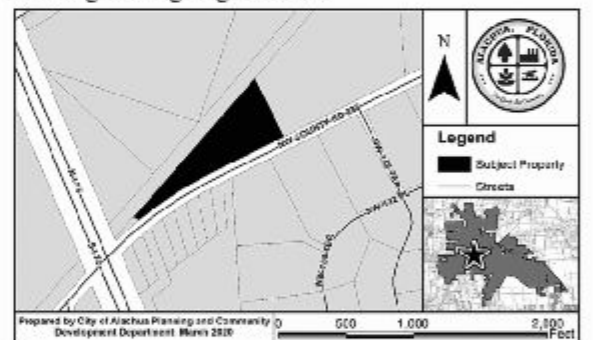

IMPORTANT INFORMATION REGARDING POSTED NOTICE SIGNS

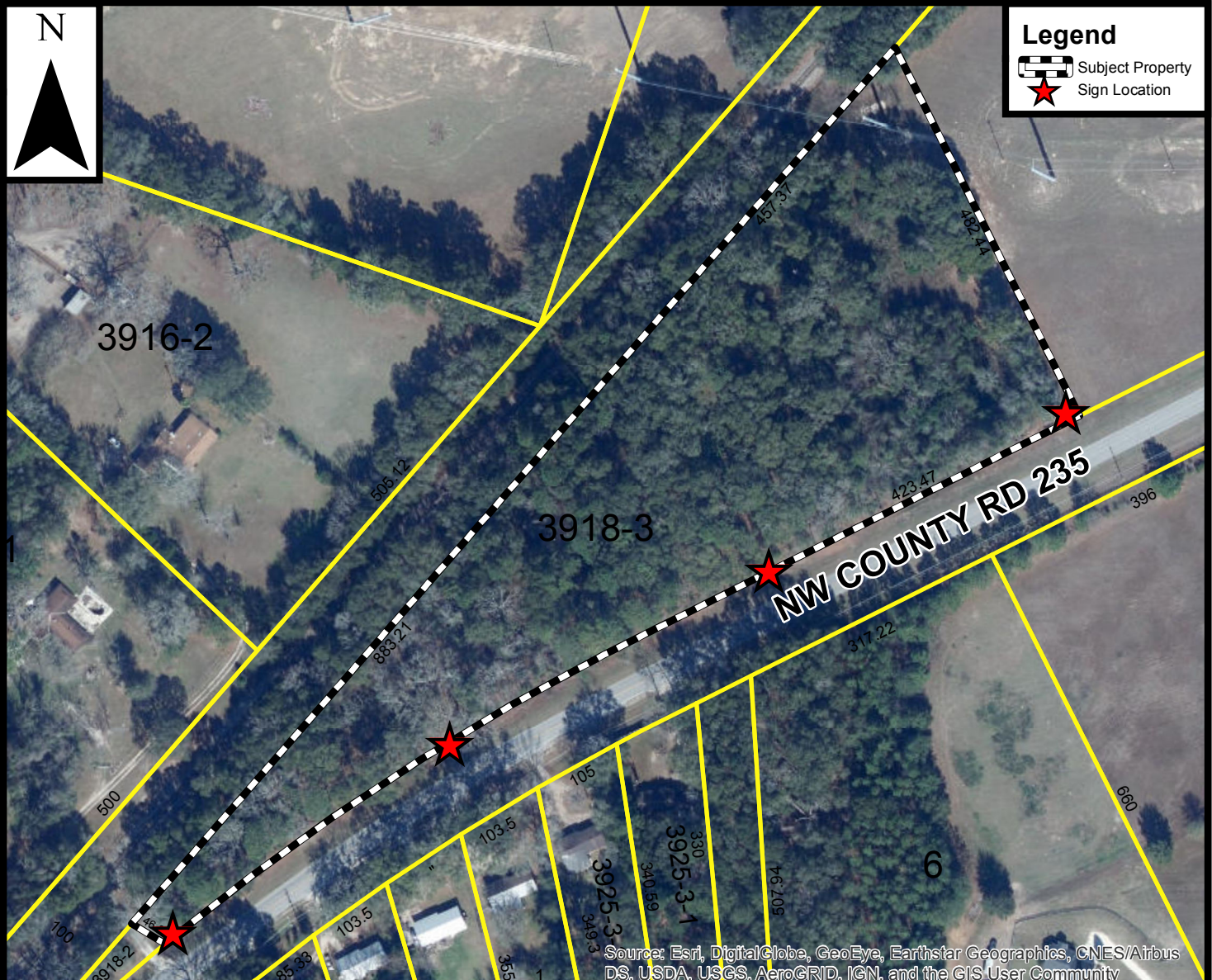
Pursuant to Section 2.2.9(D) of the City's Land Development Regulations, posted notice signs must be placed on the land that is the subject of the application, along each street which is adjacent to or runs through the land in a manner that makes them clearly visible. Signs shall be posted at intervals of not more than 400 feet when the land subject to the application has less than 1,500 feet of road frontage. When the land subject to the application has 1,500 feet or more of road frontage, signs shall be posted at intervals of not more than 1,320 feet.

Signs shall be inspected by the City subsequent to their posting. The applicant shall be responsible for ensuring that the posted notice is maintained on the land subject to the application until the completion of the final public hearing on the application.

Signs must be removed by the applicant and returned to the City within ten days after the final decision on the application.



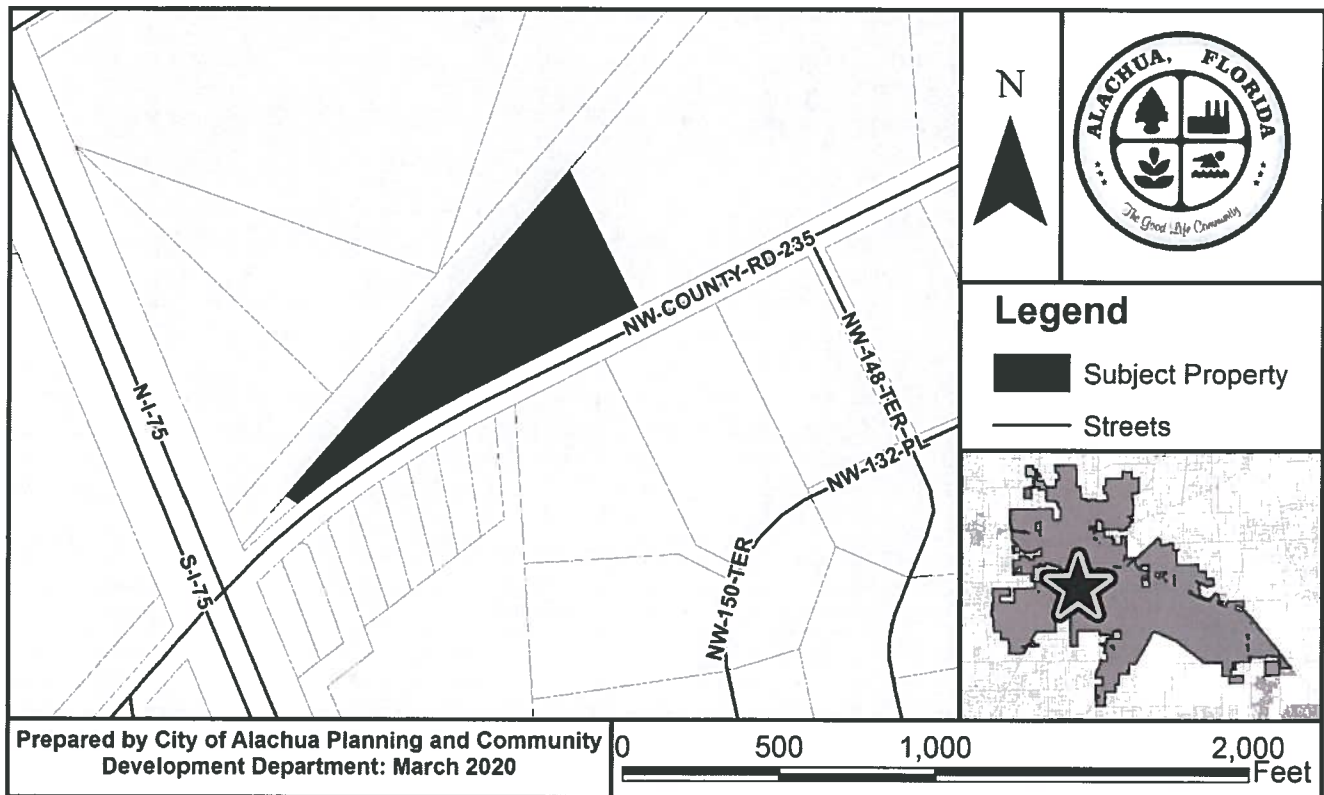
